Statistics show that the best way for anyone to land a job in their chosen field is to finish college and earn a degree or certificate. In fact, students who complete their associate degree or certificate can expect to earn about \$400,000 more in a lifetime than a high school graduate, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.


