Participate in Online Training, Earn Money for Student Veterans

Michigan has seen a 17% increase in students using Veterans Affairs benefits to pursue higher education since 2010's Post 9/11 GI Bill was enacted. As we seek to best support this growing cohort of students, it is imperative that our campus's educators understand the possible challenges student veterans face in their transition to academic and civilian life.

With financial support from the Consortium of Michigan Veterans Educators' (CMVE) Kresge Foundation grant, all public colleges and universities in Michigan have free, unlimited access to Veterans on Campus, an online training simulation aimed at helping us better understand and support our student veterans. In this 30-minute web-based course, participants will better understand the unique value of veterans in the classroom, learn skills that will equip you to understand common challenges faced by veterans, and better understand support services available for veterans. Participants will also learn how to approach the veterans they are worried about, destigmatize the need for help, and refer them to local support services.

Kalamazoo Valley's Veteran Services Office will be awarded \$500 if 118 employees participate in the training. Thank you for helping us ensure our veterans have the best educational experiences possible at Kalamazoo Valley Community College.
