Kalamazoo Valley Names New Provost and Vice President for Instruction and Student Support Services

Peter Linden, Ph. D., has been named Kalamazoo Valley Community College's new provost and vice president for instruction and student support services, it was announced Tuesday by college president L. Marshall Washington, Ph.D.

Linden, who now serves as chancellor of the Michigan City campus of Ivy Tech in Indiana, will assume his new position on July 8.

Washington said, "Dr. Linden brings a wealth of experience to his new position at Kalamazoo Valley. His experience in instruction, curriculum, student success and administration made him a perfect choice." Linden succeeds Dr. Dennis Bertch who retired in December. He was chosen from a field of dozens of candidates after a national search

Linden has a Ph.D. in higher education and policy leadership from Loyola University Chicago. He also holds a Master's degree in business administration from North Park University, a Bachelor of Science in business and management from Northeastern Illinois University and an associate degree in occupational studies from the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York.

As an educator and administrator in higher education, Linden said he lives by one motto, one that he hopes his colleagues at Kalamazoo Valley will embrace as well: "We are here to serve our students"

In his new role, Linden sees himself as a bridge-builder and a relationship-builder. He said he plans "to introduce and promote programs that are going to add to the economy of the region by way of workforce development." He hopes to do this by collaborating with high schools, area

businesses and other community partners to address the skills gap that currently exists in local industries

Prior to Ivy Tech, Linden served as academic dean of career and technical education at Joliet Junior College. "Community colleges offer more options, more affordable prices and are more responsive to the needs of the community," he said.

Momentum Graduation is June 13

Please join us as we honor the Momentum/Warehouse Management and Inventory Control Academy graduates Thursday, June 13 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at the Trenches Church, 1003 Gayle Ave. Kalamazoo. MI 49048.

Momentum Urban Employment Initiative, a division of Urban Alliance, is a six-week intensive program designed to help unemployed and underemployed individuals in our community secure and maintain employment. This is accomplished through a unique mix of essential, employability and life skills trainings, along with job placement assistance.

Kalamazoo Valley Community College partnered with Momentum to offer the Warehouse Management and Inventory Control Academy Academy – a short-term career training program that teaches the skills required for a career in warehouse management.

Thirty percent of those who enrolled in Momentum in the past year were homeless. Eighty-four percent were ex-offenders and 80% came from generational poverty. In the same year, 72% of those enrolled in the program successfully graduated; 90% were successfully place into employment with an average starting wage of \$12.96 per hour. Graduates also maintained an 81% success rate for employment retention beyond 90 days.

Wind Turbine Technician Academy Graduation Slated for June 14

The college community is invited to attend the June 14 graduation ceremony for the Wind Turbine Technician Academy June 14 at 11 a.m. at the Groves Center.

The Wind Turbine Technician Academy provides a fast track to jobs that are in demand and pay high wages. Kalamazoo Valley Community College offers this course as a non-credit full time program allowing men and women the chance to be job ready in less than six months. Students attend Monday through Friday, 8 hours each day for 24 weeks.

Resilience: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope

Recent research indicates that more than half (54%) of all adolescents aged 12 to 17 years experience Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and more than one-quarter (28%) experience two or more. The effects of trauma during childhood and adolescence have impacts on adolescent health and educational status, including a greater likelihood of repeating a grade in school, lower resilience, increased risk for learning and behavioral issues, suicidal ideation, and early initiation of sexual activity and pregnancy.

CAMPUS SAFETY TIP

 Never hit your brakes before encountering a pothole. This can actually cause more damage to your vehicle.
