Resilience: The Biology of Stress and the Science of Hope

Recent research indicates that more than half (54%) of all adolescents aged 12 to 17 years experience Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and more than one-quarter (28%) experience two or more. The effects of trauma during childhood and adolescence have impacts on adolescent health and educational status, including a greater likelihood of repeating a grade in school, lower resilience, increased risk for learning and behavioral issues, suicidal ideation, and early initiation of sexual activity and pregnancy.

Please join us for a viewing and discussion of Resilience, a documentary that chronicles the movement among pediatricians, therapists, educators and communities who are using cuttingedge brain science to disrupt cycles of violence, addiction and disease.
