Winter Weather College Closing Update

As a reminder, the college revised/expanded its closing protocols as a result of last winter's inclement weather. As we move toward winter weather, please be aware that one of the following six announcements will be used when notifying media outlets, employees and students of class

cancellations and building closures.

- Morning Classes Cancelled: Classes starting before 12 p.m. are cancelled. However, the college is open for business.
- 2. **Afternoon Classes Cancelled:** Classes starting between 12 p.m. and 3:59 p.m. are cancelled. However, the college is open for business.
- 3. **Evening Classes are Cancelled:** Classes starting between 4 p.m. through the remainder of the evening are cancelled. However, the college is open for business.
- 4. "Specific" Campus/Locations are Closed, i.e. Arcadia Commons Campus, Bronson Healthy Living Campus, Groves Campus, Texas Township Campus: The college or one or more campuses or facilities are closed for business for the day and/or evening activities.
- 5. Delayed Start: The college is closed until 10 a.m. The college is open for business at 10 a.m. and classes beginning at 10 a.m. or later will begin at their regularly scheduled times. All classes scheduled to begin prior to 10 a.m. are cancelled.
- 6. **College Closed:** The college is be closed for business, classes and activities are cancelled for the morning, afternoon and evening.

Adjusted Operating Hours

In the event hours of operation are adjusted (NOT closed or delayed start) facilities will remain open for all employees to report to work. Additionally, public meetings/events/activities scheduled during affected hours may be rescheduled.

The Certified Financial Aid Administrator (CFAA) Program certifies individuals with proficiency in the body of knowledge pertaining to administering federal (Title IV) financial aid and its interaction with state and private financial aid. To earn the CFAA certification, an individual must demonstrate sufficient industry-related experience, successfully pass a comprehensive knowledge exam and affirm commitment to the standards for ethical behavior that are a hallmark of the financial aid profession.

Kalamazoo Valley now offers secure ordering, processing and delivering of official transcripts electronically. Tibetan Buddhist monks from Drepung Loseling Monastery will construct a mandala sand painting at the Kalamazoo Valley Museum Nov. 6-10, in partnership with Connecting Chords Music Festival.

From all the artistic traditions of Tantric Buddhism, that of painting with colored sand ranks as one of the most unique and exquisite.

Millions of grains of sand are painstakingly laid into place on a flat platform over a period of days or weeks to form the image of a mandala. To date, the monks have created mandala sand paintings in more than 100 museums, art centers, and colleges and universities in the United States and Europe. more
