Serving Our Students

As many of you know, Kalamazoo Valley Community College was selected as one of 12 institutions in the Urban Ecosystems Cohort of the Excellence in Academic Advising (EAA) initiative. This is a joint effort by the John Gardner Institute and the National Academic Advising Association (NACADA), largely funded by The Kresge Foundation. This work is included in our continuing journey with Guided Pathways and is an exciting opportunity for the college.

EAA engages institutions in a holistic and systematic review of academic advising from a teaching and learning perspective, with support and guidance from experts in the field and experts in educational/organizational change. Several work groups have been formed to complete a series of Key Performance Indicator questions that are specific to each EAA Condition. This will lay the foundation of the work to create an action plan for years two and three of the grant initiative. Thank you to everyone who has already signed up! **There are still a few work group spots available!** Sign-up by March 6 if you are interested in being part of a work group. College Signs Transfer Agreements with 25 Michigan Colleges

Agreements will simplify transferring to a four-year college or university for Valley students

Transferring to a four-year college or university from Kalamazoo Valley Community College will now be even simpler thanks to new transfer agreements signed with 25 Michigan colleges and universities.

"I'm thrilled to see this agreement come to fruition," said Dr. Peter Linden, provost and vice president for instruction and student services for Kalamazoo Valley Community College. "More than 50 percent of Kalamazoo Valley students transfer to a four-year institution after goal completion at Kalamazoo Valley. This agreement gives students more options and ensures a seamless transition – saving them both time and money."

Transfer agreements will allow Kalamazoo Valley students to transfer more credits to four-year schools in the areas of biology, business, criminal justice and psychology. The new agreements specify major-specific courses that students should complete while enrolled at Kalamazoo Valley Community College that are common across all institutions in Michigan. The identification of these courses makes it easier for students to complete essential courses before deciding where to transfer. more

Business Card Ordering

OfficeMax/Office Depot is no longer printing employee business cards.

When your business card supply is low, fill out the business card request form.

It can be found here: MyValley >Workplace>Employee Services>Business Card Request Form.

The form can be uploaded and submitted to Printing Services, where the cards will be designed and printed. The form can also be sent through inter-office mail or dropped off at TTC Printing Services, Room 8160.

Employees will receive a proof of the card to review before it is printed. After approval, 250 cards will be printed. Employees will be notified via email when the cards are ready. TTC employees will need to pick up their cards from Printing Services. Employees at all other campuses will have their cards delivered. The process should take approximately two weeks.

It's Time to get Real

A message from Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson (and Public Safety Director of Public Safety Rick Ives)

Your Michigan driver's license or identification card may not get you through airport security later this year.

Oct. 1 is when the federal government will fully enforce the post-9/11 REAL ID Act, and standard state-issued driver's licenses and identification cards will no longer be accepted to board domestic flights within the United States, or when entering certain federal facilities, such as military bases or nuclear power plants.

Many people already have a REAL ID document, such as a valid U.S. passport, a DHS Trusted Traveler Card or an Enhanced Driver's License. A full list of acceptable REAL ID documents is available at ISA.gov. Those who don't can make their Michigan license or identification REAL ID-compliant by visiting a Secretary of State branch office and presenting the required documents. And, if you make an appointment, you'll be in and out in 30 minutes or less.

Here's what you need to do to get a REAL ID:

- To schedule an appointment at one of our branch offices, visit
 <u>Michigan.gov/SOSAppointments</u> or call 888-SOS-MICH. You can make your appointment
 at any branch in the state, and you don't need to have a renewal mailer to do so. Some
 branches fill up fast, so book your appointment a few weeks in advance of when you plan
 to travel. Your REAL ID license or state ID card will be mailed to you.
- Bring your driver's license or state identification card.
- Bring your certified birth certificate with a raised seal or stamp issued by a governmental agency; your valid, unexpired U.S. passport; or an approved citizenship or legal presence document. (Faxes and photocopies won't be accepted.)
- If your name differs from what is on your birth certificate, bring certified documents for every time your name has changed, such as a marriage license or court order.

There's no additional fee to turn a license or state ID card into a standard REAL ID if it's done during your normal renewal time; otherwise a duplicate card fee of \$9 or \$10 will be charged. more
