Kalamazoo Valley Community College hosted a virtual commencement celebration on April 26 for the 500 students who petitioned to graduate at the end of the Winter 2020 Semester. The online event, necessary due to COVID-19 stay-at-home restrictions, can be seen <u>here</u>.

Graduates and their families and friends were invited to hear a welcome address by college President L. Marshall Washington, Ph.D. A number of faculty and staff members sang together. Pre-recorded speeches by Board of Trustees Chairman Jeffrey Patton, faculty speaker Jason Bishop, and nursing student Elizabeth Odeyemi can also be viewed. The video messages are also posted on the college's social media accounts. Those who wish to share their own messages to the graduates are asked to tag them with #wewill.

"We will always hold a special place in our hearts for the graduating class of winter 2020," said Washington. "Their achievement is particularly impressive because they accomplished this milestone during one of the most unprecedented times in our nation's history."

In addition to the virtual celebration, the winter 2020 graduates are invited to walk in the commencement ceremony that will be held in December 2020.

Payroll through May 15

Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has modified the "Stay Home - Stay Safe" Executive Order. As a result some employees have been notified to return to college buildings to prepare for our eventual reopening of all campus locations. Unless you have been otherwise notified by your supervisor that you are an essential employee, you are to continue to work at home through May 15. The college has committed to continuing pay through pay period #9 (timesheets are to be submitted by May 1, 2020) in the same fashion.

Employees are to enter time for the hours **they are scheduled to work for this period** as "Regular Hours." Please ensure work done remotely doesn't exceed scheduled hours. Regular deadlines for submission and approval of leave reports and time sheets still apply.

Employees who are not available for work, please discuss your situation with your supervisor and use available leave balances. Also note the April leave reports are due May 7, with approvals due May 10. If you have questions, please contact the payroll department at <u>payroll@kvcc.edu</u>.

Valley CARES Application Now Available

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented both Kalamazoo Valley and our students with unprecedented challenges. In consideration of this, the college has created the **Valley CARES Emergency Assistance Fund**. The Valley CARES Emergency Assistance Fund provides limited emergency financial support to students who have experienced unexpected expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to the coronavirus.

All Title IV eligible students (student who received funds by completing the FAFSA or could have applied for funds through FAFSA) who experienced additional expenses related to the disruption of campus operations can apply. To determine Title IV eligibility, a <u>FAFSA</u> must be on file. Other

options to assist with expenses may also be available, so please encourage students to submit the application even if they are not Title IV eligible.

The Valley CARES Emergency Assistance Fund application is now available. It can also be found in in a students MyValley account, by selecting <u>Valley Cares Application</u>, under "My Links."

Eligible expenses for Valley CARES funding include, but are not necessarily limited to, medical, food, housing, utilities, technology expenses, laptop/tablet purchase, unexpected childcare, course materials, and other unexpected expenses included in the student's cost of attendance.

Important Information about the Summer Tuition Payment Deadline

Students enrolled in summer semester classes have until May 21 to pay their balance in full, sign up for the payment plan, or have financial aid in place to cover the balance.

Students who have registered for classes and are no longer planning to attend, must drop those courses themselves before the end of the add/drop period or they will be responsible for the tuition owed. For classes slated to begin May 11, classes must be dropped by May 21. Contact Admissions, Registration and Records at <u>arr@kvcc.edu</u> or 269.488.4281 for questions about dropping a class.

To lessen their financial burden, additional <u>payment plan options</u> have been added to allow for the payments to be spread out over additional months, now going into July and August.

As a reminder, all tuition balances must be paid in full before grades can be released and/or transcripts can be sent. Additionally, if tuition is not paid, students will be unable to register for fall semester classes.


An Update from the KVCC Foundation

EDMT Instructors partner with Local Manufacturer to Make Face Masks and Shields



Kalamazoo Valley Community College has partnered with Vicksburg-based Eimo Technologies to produce face masks and shields for use by area medical professionals. Since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the need for personal protective equipment (PPE) has grown more urgent every day. As a result, Kalamazoo Valley faculty members Dave Brock and Bill Kring began exploring ways to create masks and face shields using the college's CNC machines and 3D printers.

Brock and Kring worked diligently in the Engineering Design and Manufacturing Technology (EDMT) lab to design, manufacture, and assemble face masks and shields based on a design they received from a major 3D manufacturer, Stratasys. Both men are EDMT faculty members and serve as co-chairs of the EDMT department.

The duo successfully created a prototype of a mask with a commonly available filter material that has tested similar to the level of a N95 mask. Corresponding filter elements can be replaced, and the shell sanitized for re-use. They are now able to produce 250 masks and 400 shields per day with a group of four volunteers helping with assembly. <u>MORE</u>
