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2021 Summer Hours

Each year, the President, with input from the President's Cabinet, may consider and review the summer work schedule. With an eye toward energy conservation, moderating cooling costs and

benefiting employees, it has been determined that the college will adopt a four day work week during the time frame below:

Summer Hours May 17, 2021 – August 13, 2021 Monday – Thursday 7:30 a.m. – 5 p.m. (With ½ hour for lunch)

We are well aware that information technologies, facilities services, public safety, financial services and other departments with evening hours will adjust schedules to ensure coverage of important functions.

In cooperation with the department supervisor, individuals may be able to adjust their four day work week schedule to Monday - Thursday 8 a.m. - 5:30 p.m.

Employees who have earned to paid vacation time will take that time in half day blocks (4.5 hours) or full day blocks (9.0 hours). This is pro-rated for employees working less than 40 hours per week.

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Winter Sports Season Canceled at Kalamazoo Valley Community College

Kalamazoo Valley Community College President L. Marshall Washington, Ph.D., announced this week the cancellation of the college's winter sports season. The school — which competes in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), Region 12 — made its decision amid an unprecedented spike in the coronavirus pandemic nationally.

"The college is committed to safeguarding the health and well-being of student-athletes, the campus community and general public," Washington said. "Because of this, I have made the difficult decision to cancel Cougar athletics for the winter sports season. I recognize how disappointing this is for our coaches, athletes and their families. I look forward to the day that they can once again compete in a safe environment."

Volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball were affected by the announcement.

A decision about the future of spring sports – baseball and softball – will be made by March 1, 2021. The two teams have canceled spring training trips to Florida, which were scheduled for the first week of March.

- Employee time sheet submission due date is MONDAY, January 4, 2021 at 5 p.m.
- Manager approval of time sheets is due **TUESDAY**, January 5, 2021 at 5 p.m.
- This pay covers the period 12.13.20 01.02.21 (this is a three week period); full-time hourly employees should enter TOP (time off paid) for the college holidays of December 24, 25, 28, 29, 30, 31 and January 1.

If you will not be on campus when time sheets are due, please ensure that your time sheet is completed and submitted prior to leaving campus. If you normally approve time sheets and will not be on campus on the due date, please ensure you have a proxy set up to approve your time sheets, or approve your time sheets before you leave campus. Alternatively, if you are off campus and have internet access, you can log in to your <u>MyValley</u> account to access the Banner Self Service application to submit and/or approve time sheets.

New Kick Start Classes Offered for Winter Semester

Faculty at Kalamazoo Valley Community College have announced several courses that will be offered in the Winter 2021 semester in a new format called "Kick Start." This program requires students to attend in-person, the first four class sessions at the start of the term. After the first four weeks, the remaining courses in the term will be offered in an asynchronous online format. Students will have opportunities to take science, law enforcement, critical thinking, First Year Experience and blended English and reading classes in the Kick Start format.
