Celebrating Black History Month 2021

It was in 1964 when the author James Baldwin reflected on the shortcomings of his education. "When I was going to school," he said, "I began to be bugged by the teaching of American history because it seemed that that history had been taught without cognizance of my presence."

Baldwin's thoughts echoed those of many before and after him. Half a century earlier, when Carter G. Woodson had the same frustration, he set the foundation for what would become today's national Black History Month, observed each February.

"If a race has no history, it has no worthwhile tradition, it becomes a negligible factor in the thought of the world, and it stands in danger of being exterminated," Woodson said of the need for such study.

In 1926, Woodson and others launched a "Negro History Week" to bring attention to his mission and help school systems coordinate their focus on the topic. Woodson chose the second week in February, as it encompassed both Frederick Douglass' birthday on February 14 and Abraham Lincoln's birthday on February 12. More

New Scholarship for Adult Learners Launches Tomorrow

Adults 25 years or older, who have a high school degree and live in Michigan, will soon have a tuition-free pathway to community college through the Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Development called Michigan Reconnect. It's a scholarship program designed specifically for eligible adults who want to pursue an associate degree at a Michigan community college or a skills certificate at a training school. Michigan Reconnect pays the remaining balance of in-district tuition and mandatory fees after other state and federal financial aid have been applied. Students who attend out-of-district community colleges will receive a large tuition discount.

Who's Eligible? Adults age 25 years and older at the time of application who have lived in Michigan for a year or more, have a high school diploma or GED, are not in default on a federal student loan and have not yet completed an associate or bachelor's degree.

The application launches Feb. 2.

Wellness and Fitness Center Reopening

The Wellness and Fitness Center facilities have reopened following a phased-in approach as outlined below. This includes the WFC (Room 6060) and the locker rooms. The pool will remain closed until further notice. The free weight room will remain closed until further notice; however, exceptions may be made for WPE instructor-led classes upon request. At this time, student usage will be limited to those currently enrolled in on-site WPE classes and only during the scheduled class times for the WFC; employee usage will be limited to those currently working on-site at the Texas Township Campus. New guidelines will be in place to ensure compliance with all safety recommendations including proper social distancing and adequate cleaning. Please make note of the following: scanning-in and out with college ID will be strictly enforced to comply with contact tracing requirements, face masks will be required to be worn at all times, patrons will receive a bottle of cleaner and a cloth upon entry and will be instructed on proper procedures for cleaning equipment after each usage, the blue lockers upstairs will not be accessible and towels will not be available. This employee, who requested to remain anonymous, recently presented a check for \$94.72 to the Foundation to help support the Valley Food Share program. ""Wherever I walk, I often find loose change," she said. "Since much of it is found here on campus, I think it should stay on campus and donating it to a good cause is something we all can celebrate. And I'd like to say thank you to all those people who leave money around for me to find."

When she received the check, Foundation administrative assistant, Vicki Warkoczeski, was immediately impressed. "I've seen many examples of philanthropy in my day," Warkoczeski said. "This is one of the best, great ingenuity on the employee's part."

Valley Food Share, launched in March of 2019, is an initiative designed to meet the immediate hunger needs of currently enrolled Kalamazoo Valley students. Hunger and food insecurity issues can deeply affect students' educational efforts and outcomes. A recent survey found that 45% of college students were food insecure in the prior 30 days.
