Vaccination Follow Up

On Feb. 9, 2021, members of the Kalamazoo Valley Human Resources Department and I met virtually with members of the Kalamazoo County Health and Community Services Department (Health Department). During the meeting, Health Department, officials shared the progress of distributing the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) vaccination throughout Kalamazoo County.

Vaccination clinics are currently scheduled on Tuesdays and Thursdays each week with a goal of administering 2,000 vaccinations each day that the clinics are open. In addition to Health Department staff there are approximately 400 retired physicians and nurses who have volunteered to assist in the effort.

The vaccines are also being distributed by Kalamazoo's two local hospitals, with 60% of the available vaccines going to the Health Department and 40% going to the hospitals. During the meeting, the Health Department representatives shared the obstacles created by the limited supply of vaccine availability. They are using both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines and there are currently 26,000 people on the waiting list. The Health Department is following its priority list while assuring that the distribution process is equitable, transparent and efficient.

With this in mind, I would like to reference my prior communications. On Dec. 16, 2020, at the request of the Kalamazoo County Office of Emergency Management, I asked all employees to complete a survey to determine their interest in participating in Phase 1B vaccination. After sharing the survey with the Office of Emergency Management, the Michigan Community College Association (MCCA) notified all Michigan community colleges that only K-12 schools and not community colleges would be included in Phase 1B. The Health Department is abiding by the priority rule and has encouraged me to direct employees to its website to determine vaccination

registration eligibility.

The progress of vaccination in Kalamazoo County is promising. As more information becomes available, I will continue to keep all employees updated.

Kalamazoo Valley Libraries: Connecting Your Students to Technology and More

Wondering how your students can get the equipment they need to connect with you and carry out their course work? Kalamazoo Valley Libraries can help.

How can my student get a laptop?

Once your students have filled out the <u>laptop loan application</u> and received approval by email, they may borrow a laptop from either library location—Texas Township or Arcadia Commons. They may keep their laptop for the entire semester.

What if my student does not have internet access?

No worries. Students can fill out a <u>mobile wi-fi hotspot application</u> to receive email approval and borrow the necessary hardware for the semester. The hotspots will allow the students to access the internet wherever they are, wirelessly.

Can students get calculators at the library, too?

Yes, they can! Scientific and graphing calculators are available for semester-long checkout – no pre-approval required.

Do you (or your students) have other questions?

We offer much more than hardware! We can hold and provide access to your course materials, help answer tough research questions, assist navigation of complex databases and scour library systems to put that sought-after resource in your hands.
