COVID-19 Vaccine Information

In my recent communication dated March 14, 2021, I told you that the college would provide updated COVID-19 (Coronavirus) vaccination information as it became available and I am writing to remind you about the most recent announcement from Kalamazoo County Health and Community Services.

Kalamazoo County Health & Community Services Department is announcing that starting Tuesday, March 30, people who are 16 years or older who live in Kalamazoo County are eligible to receive a COVID-19 (Coronavirus) vaccine from the health department.

Appointment scheduling process for **people over the age of 16 who live in Kalamazoo** County:

Starting March 30, people over the age of 16 who live in Kalamazoo County may use the
online self-scheduling system. Appointments are released on Mondays at 7 a.m., 12 p.m.
and 5 p.m. at <u>www.kalcounty.com/covid19vaccine</u>. New appointments may be added after
Monday and throughout the week as existing appointments are cancelled. Residents with

limited internet access are encouraged to call the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) Call Center at 269.373.5200 for assistance in scheduling appointments.

• Please note, those under the age of 18 may only schedule a Pfizer vaccine appointment. A parent or guardian must also accompany minors at the vaccination clinic.

Appointment scheduling process for people over the age of 50, people 16-49 years old with disabilities and/or underlying medical conditions, or caregivers of children with special needs:

- Kalamazoo County residents over the age of 50 continue to be prioritized for vaccination as well as people 16-49 years old with disabilities and/or underlying medical conditions and caregivers of children with special needs. The health department reserves special appointment slots at upcoming clinics for this group.
- If you qualify in this group and have not yet received the COVID-19 (Coronavirus) vaccine and wish to do so, call the health department's COVID-19 (Coronavirus) Call Center at 269.373.5200 to schedule your appointment.

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) has <u>expanded eligibility for</u> <u>COVID-19 vaccinations</u>. Under their guidelines, all Michiganders age 16 and up will be eligible to receive a vaccination beginning April 5.

As vaccine prioritization guidance evolves, and more Michiganders become eligible, the scheduling process and strategy within Kalamazoo County is subject to change.

With our healthcare systems, Ascension Borgess, Bronson Health Care, Family Health Center, and WMed Health, equitable distribution of COVID-19 (Coronavirus) vaccine remains the focus of the joint vaccination strategy in Kalamazoo County. All organizations continue to collaborate to ensure vaccinations are provided in a variety of geographic locations throughout Kalamazoo County and at a variety of community locations including senior centers, churches, schools, homeless shelters, and those in congregate living situations. Vaccination efforts in Kalamazoo County will continue to prioritize residents based on highest risk, including older adults, those with underlying medical conditions, and frontline workers.

Important points: The most up-to-date information is

at <u>www.kalcounty.com/covid19</u> and <u>www.facebook.com/KalamazooCountyHCS</u>. The health department will notify the public via press releases, social media and website updates as information changes.

- If you schedule an appointment but find another option or cannot make it, **please** remember to cancel your appointment so someone else can schedule.
- Vaccination is by appointment only. Do NOT show up at the health department or any vaccination site without an appointment.
- All eligible residents are also encouraged to explore vaccination through other vaccine providers in the area, including Meijer Pharmacy and Rite Aid Pharmacies.
- Please reserve phone calls for those who cannot easily access online information. The health department's COVID-19 (Coronavirus) Call Center is 269.373.5200.

We have been told that other options for vaccinations are available through <u>vaccinefinder.org</u>. Although these opportunities are not sponsored by Kalamazoo Valley Community College, we are encouraging all employees to access the vaccine when it becomes available to them. Thank you.

Former College Archivist has a Newly Published Book

Kalamazoo Valley Community College bookstore employee and former college archivist Gary Gibson has a newly published book, *Kalamazoo County and the Civil War*. It's available for purchase on campus in the bookstore and at other vendors like Amazon and Target.

Gibson, who earned an associate of arts in history from Kalamazoo Valley before he went on to pursue his bachelor of science degree with a major in public history, is a volunteer curator at Michigan's Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Hall and Museum, a Civil War veterans'

museum in Eaton Rapids. Several years ago, he began researching the unmarked graves of Civil War veterans in Kalamazoo and eventually compiled the men's stories and secured headstones through the Veteran's Administration. "I felt their stories needed to be told," Gibson said of soldiers he learned about.

His book is "not a typical Civil War history book," Gibson explains. "I talk about what was going on in Kalamazoo before, during and after the Civil War. It contains a lot of human interest stories." For instance, Gibson discovered that the Ladies' Soldiers Aid Society raised money to buy necessities for Kalamazoo's troops. During the Civil War, there were five regiments including men from Kalamazoo, who trained at the former harness racing track in the Washington Square neighborhood. Over 3,000 Kalamazoo County men served in the war and 396 did not return home.

Gibson spent about two and a half years researching and compiling previously untold Civil War stories related to Kalamazoo. He was contacted by The History Press of Arcadia Publishing in Charleston, South Carolina and sent about 50 photos and the book proposal before completing the project.

"It was a neat experience," Gibson said. "I had a great editor to work with and I'm looking at doing another book. It seems kind of surreal."

Margaret DeRitter is the poetry editor and copy editor of Encore, a regional magazine based in

Kalamazoo, Michigan. She is the author of *Singing Back to the Sirens* (Unsolicited Press, 2020) and was a winner of the 2018 Celery City Chapbook Contest, sponsored by Kalamazoo's Friends of Poetry, for her chapbook *Fly Me to Heaven By Way of New Jersey*. Her writing has appeared in the anthologies *Surprised By Joy* (Wising Up Press) and *Queer Around the World*(Qommunicate Publishing) and in a number of journals, including *The 3288 Review*, which nominated her poem "At the top of Sleeping Bear Dunes" for a Pushcart Prize. DeRitter has also written numerous magazine and newspaper articles. She worked for 22 years at the *Kalamazoo Gazette* and has taught journalism at Western Michigan University and Kalamazoo College. She was born and raised in New Jersey and has lived in Michigan since college. When not writing or editing, she often paddles Michigan lakes and rivers.
