

Beginning Monday, June 21 O Avenue between 6th and 8th Streets will be closed for construction. Seek an alternate route.




EAA - Advising Selection and Development Task Force

The Advising Selection and Development Task Force consists of 16 active members with diverse departments represented including Human Resources, Advising and Counseling, Office of Student Access, Financial Aid, Admin Support, Kalamazoo Promise, Employment Services and Apprenticeships.

The kick-off meetings were held in late May where members reviewed the EAA Platform and divided responsibilities into sub-working groups. The KPI's umbrella consists of Hiring Practices, Advisor Development and Practices, Recognition and Reward, Professional Development and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. The Task Force is in the process of understanding the KPIs and gathering evidence data to guide our research.

The Task Force members will be meeting twice a month.



Erick Martin Named the MCCA 2021 Outstanding Faculty Award Recipient Kalamazoo Valley Community College welding instructor Erick Martin has been named the Michigan Community College Association's 2021 Outstanding Faculty Award recipient. "This is a great recognition of the high quality faculty from your college," said MCCA President Michael Hansen. Martin will be honored at the organization's summer conference in July.

"We are proud of Erick and his latest achievement," said college President L. Marshall Washington, Ph.D. "He's one of a kind and we're fortunate to have him sharing his expertise with our welding students."

Martin has worked at Kalamazoo Valley since 1998. He helped to develop rapid training options that enable students to achieve a welding skill set and degree in one semester with both daytime and evening classes. He has represented the technical trades department on the Academic Leadership Council for 10 years and has served on a number of hiring and search committees, ensuring that the college is hiring the most qualified applicants. more

KPS and Community Partners Awarded Grant to Create Apprenticeship Program

Kalamazoo Public Schools has been awarded a grant from the Partnership to Advance Youth Apprenticeship (PAYA) to expand apprenticeships for high-school aged youth in the Kalamazoo area through a new effort called Career Launch Kalamazoo. The \$25,000 grant will support Career Launch Kalamazoo strategy development and implementation through fall 2022. In addition to funding, the grant also includes more than \$1 million of in-kind support for technical assistance, strategic planning, coaching sessions with experts, learning trips, access to learning partners, problems of practice and cycles of inquiry work to enhance programming.

PAYA also will provide Career Launch Kalamazoo with technical assistance from PAYA's national partners, cross-site learning opportunities, and opportunities to participate in national research, communications, and access to the PAYA Network, a group of organizations working to expand and improve apprenticeships for high schoolers.

The grant will support the work of local employers, educators, community partners and policy leaders who are building high-quality youth apprenticeship programs that promote inclusive economic development and create new opportunities for young people.

The grant drew more than 200 applications, and KPS received one of only six grants awarded this year. KPS is one of 17 grantees from across the country that has been funded over the years. With the grant, KPS will partner with Kalamazoo Valley Community College, the City of Kalamazoo, The Kalamazoo Promise, Bronson Healthcare Group, Flowserve and MANN+HUMMEL to create Career Launch Kalamazoo, a program designed to provide KPS students with apprenticeships in three high-demand career areas: information technology, healthcare, and manufacturing.

Kalamazoo Valley Libraries: In-Person Access to Textbook Reserves Has Returned

Has it been difficult for your students to access their textbooks off campus? Have your students missed being able to use reserve copies of their textbooks in the library? Most are available for a 3 hour loan during the library's open hours.

Respiratory Care Program Receives Credentialing Success Award

The Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care (CoARC) has presented the Respiratory Care Practitioner program at Kalamazoo Valley Community College its Distinguished RRT (Registered Respiratory Therapy) Credentialing Success Award. This distinction is awarded as a part of the CoARC's continued efforts to value the RRT credential as a standard of professional achievement. This is the program's fourth consecutive year to receive this award.

The primary responsibility of CoARC is to accredit programs based on their compliance with established accreditation standards. Respiratory Care Program Director Susan Pearson said, "Our goal is to prepare students for important life-saving careers in respiratory care, especially now, as the world's attention is focused on respiratory-related illnesses caused by the COVID-19 virus and other diseases. Kalamazoo Valley's program selection for this recognition provides our program with the acknowledgement it deserves."

Kalamazoo Valley's program prepares graduates for national credentialing examinations which lead to certification and registry. Extensive adult and neonatal critical care experience is included as a part of this program. Major emphasis is placed upon cardiopulmonary critical care technology. "Our students receive nationally recognized training both in the classroom and in the field," said Provost and Vice President for Instruction and Student Services, Paige Eagan, Ph.D. "We are very pleased to receive the CoARC Credentialing Success Award."

2021 Alumni+ Art Show Winners Announced

The awards presentation for Kalamazoo Valley's Tenth Alumni+ Art Show took place during Art Hop on Friday, June 4 at the Center for New Media in downtown Kalamazoo. This juried art show enables Kalamazoo Valley alumni to showcase their works in a professional gallery setting. This year's show includes 58 entries from 22 alumni artists who work in the genres of ceramics, carving, digital art, painting, video art and more. The art show, launched in April 2010, is sponsored by Kalamazoo Valley's Alumni+ program, and is a way for graduates, former students and supporters of Kalamazoo Valley to stay connected to the college and each other. The award winning artists, their prizes and background information follows below.

Show Judge

Judging Kalamazoo Valley's 2021 Alumni+ Art Show was Katherine Ransbottom. Ransbottom has been Associate Curator of Collections and Exhibitions at the Kalamazoo Institute of Art (KIA) since 2018. She started at the KIA as a curatorial intern in 2012. Most recently she curated at the KIA *Natural Forms: Contemporary Works by Japanese Women* (2019), and *Through the Years: Selections from the Asian Collection* (2021). She holds a BA in Art History and an MA in Museum Studies

BEST OF SHOW - \$500

Stephen Maronto | "Green Crystaline" | ceramic, clay, glazed

This is Stephen Maronto's first time entering a Kalamazoo Valley Alumni+ Art Show. He attended Kalamazoo Valley between 1991 and 2020. His work has previously been shown and for sale in the Kalamazoo Valley Potters' Fall Art Show and Sale in 2018. Mr. Maronto was a participating artist at the 2019 Art Show and Sale, held at Second Reformed Church, Kalamazoo. The fall 2017 issue of KIA's magazine *Sightlines* noted Maronto's crystalline glazed ceramic work as one of six local artists whose work was chosen to be sold at the KIA shop.

DIRECTOR'S CHOICE - \$400

Cathy Green | "Endangered" | glazed stoneware 2021 is Cathy's third time entering her work in Kalamazoo Valley's Alumni+ Art Show, previously entering in 2017 and 2019. Her work entered in 2017 won an Honorable Mention. She attended Kalamazoo Valley between 1989 and 2006 and is a member of the Kalamazoo Valley Potters. Green has been working with clay since the 1970s and her love of nature is reflected in much of her work. Her work can be seen at her website and at the Bridge Street Gallery, Plainwell, Spirit of Kalamazoo Shop, and at the Kellogg Bird Sanctuary, Augusta.

FIRST PLACE - \$300

Tracy Klinesteker | "Beaver Island Marsh" | soft pastel on UArt Board, gesso
This was Tracy's fifth year entering work in Valley's Alumni+ Show. She entered Valley's Alumni+
Art show in 2015, 2018, 2019 and 2020. Previous entries garnered a 2nd Place award in 2019,
and Best of Show in 2020. She attended Kalamazoo Valley in 2013 and 2014 and is a member
of the Great Lakes Pastel Society. Her pastel work was previously on exhibit at the People's
Church of Kalamazoo in 2017. As part of a KIA project Klinesteker, along with Frank Wolf,
presented an ARTBREAK TALK-Making Art Accessible to the Blind. This presentation is now
